SB 26-146: RESTRICT SINGLE-USE FOOD SERVICEWARE DISTRIBUTION

Fiscal note status: The final fiscal note reflects the enrolled bill. This bill was vetoed by the Governor on June 2, 2026; therefore, the impacts identified in this analysis do not take effect.

Summary Information

Overview. The bill would have expanded the Plastic Pollution Reduction Act to restrict the provision of single-use food serviceware by restaurants and food delivery services, with exceptions.

Types of impacts. The bill was projected to affect the following areas on a one-time basis:

- Minimal State Workload
- Local Government

Appropriations. No appropriation would have been required.

Summary of Legislation

Beginning January 1, 2027, the bill expands the Plastic Pollution Reduction Act to restrict the provision of single-use food serviceware by retail food establishments and third-party food delivery services unless requested by the customer, with some exceptions. Exceptions to the requirements include:

- single-use food serviceware provided at a self-service station or special event;
- meals provided as part of a social service program;
- retail food establishments in a public airport;
- meals provided to guests staying at a hotel, lodging house, or rooming house;
- single-use food serviceware intended to prevent spills;
- meals provided to patients or residents of a health facility; and
- school cafeterias.

For the purposes of the act, the bill also adds farmers markets and roadside markets and kitchens operated under the Cottage Foods Act to the definition of retail food establishments.

The Department of Public Health and Environment (CDPHE) is required to establish a page on its website that lists the bill's requirements and enforcement mechanisms. Enforcement is limited to violations by retail food establishments and are delegated to local governments.

Background

[House Bill 21-1162](#) enacted the Plastic Pollution Reduction Act, which phased-out the use of single-use plastic bags and polystyrene foam takeout containers for ready-to-eat food. The act authorizes a local government to enforce a violation of the act in the manner it chooses within its boundaries. Counties are authorized to seek injunctive relief against a retail food establishment located within the unincorporated boundaries of the county and may impose a civil penalty of up to \$500 for a second violation and up to \$1,000 for a third or subsequent violation. State Expenditures

The bill will minimally increase workload in the Department of Agriculture and the Department of Public Health and Environment, as discussed below.

Department of Agriculture

Workload will minimally increase for the Department of Agriculture to communicate the provisions of the bill with regulated farmers markets and food producers within regular correspondences to stakeholders. This workload is expected to be minimal and no change in appropriations is required.

Department of Public Health and Environment

The CDPHE will experience a minimal increase in workload to create a webpage with information on the bill's requirements and enforcement mechanism, as well as respond to inquiries about the bill's prohibitions. No change in appropriations is required.

Local Government

This bill may increase local government revenue from penalties and expenditures for enforcement actions for local governments that choose to enforce violations of the bill.

Effective Date

The bill takes effect 90 days following adjournment of the General Assembly sine die, assuming no referendum petition is filed.
